Goldwing Road Riders Association has always promoted "**safety through education**". GWRRA Rider Education, working with MSF and other motorcycle safety programs, is committed to excellence in motorcycle safety.

Through commitment, education, and application, GWRRA members can reduce our "incident" rate significantly. On a recent ride, we had an "incident". The purpose of this article is not to go into the details of the "incident" but to bring to light WHAT happened after the "incident". NH-A has NEVER practiced MOTORCYCLE CRASH SCENE RE-SPONSE like the fire drills we practiced in elementary school, but the unthinkable DOES HAPPEN. And SOME-WHERE from listening to our Ride Educators and attending seminars, it was there, ingrained in our minds, when we had to respond! It was wonderful to see the response spring to action: The Ride Captain took the riders in front of the "incident" to a safe parking place. Two members took spots at the front and back of the "incident" to direct traffic. A member equipped with a first aid kit from their bike administered first aid. Two other members shut off the bike and righted it. Other members talked and reassured the rider to make sure they stayed calm. Thankfully, there was no need to call for emergency help and all were fine and were able to continue the ride home. As Chapter Directors, we were proud to see how NH-A members jumped into action, without direction, to secure the scene and insure the safety of everyone that afternoon.

NH-A is very proud to have two members in our chapter that are Ride Educators: Dick Bernier, NH/VT District Educator and NH-A Chapter Educator and Doug Melanson, NH-A Assistant Chapter Educator. Each month, they present seminars and videos and discuss topics to promote motorcycle safety. There are additional seminars and riding classes that are offered throughout the year at rallies and at special classes but the **TRUTH** is that you don't have to go any further than your monthly chapter gathering to get training. And remember that every GWRRA Chapter has an education portion at their monthly get-together...so NH has 3 other chapters and VT has 2 chapters...and there are plenty of neighboring chapters and districts. There is a **WEALTH** of GWRRA education out there!

So keep attending your monthly chapter gathering and we urge you to visit other GWRRA monthly chapter gatherings as well....not only are they **FUN**...but you will **LEARN** something too! And it will be there when you need it the most.



Our next chapter gathering is scheduled for Friday, October 21st. Don't miss the fun.


















Tips for Riding in the Rain

If you're like most riders, you avoid riding in the rain, but sometimes, it just can't be avoided. Sometimes you have to be somewhere at a certain time and the weather just won't cooperate. Other times the rain comes at a most inopportune and inconvenient time. Then there's always that passing shower that just pops up during the course of a ride on an otherwise glorious day.

There are also times when storms come up that can be dangerous, such as a heavy or severe thunderstorm, hail, high winds, etc. When these conditions are encountered, the best option is to find a safe, and hopefully dry, place to pull off the road and wait for the storm to pass. Most of the time, however, rain doesn't have to dampen the enjoyment of riding. With a little knowledge and preparation, riding in the rain can be reasonably safe, and even fun.

Stay Comfortable and Dry

You want to stay dry so you can be comfortable and avoid the distractions associated with the discomfort of being wet. Investing in good, waterproof rain gear can be the difference between enduring a ride in the rain and enjoying the ride. Supplementing your usual gear with a waterproof shell or liner is a good way to go, with the shell (outerwear worn over riding clothes and sometimes even over other outer riding gear) typically being more effective than liners which can sometimes be prone to leakage. Look for rain gear that packs small, fits snug but not too tight, easily adjusts for a snug fit over a variety of other clothes and layers, and is reasonably easy to put on and take off. Waterproof boots or gators are also a must, as are waterproof, gauntlet style gloves, especially when it's cold.



Keep a Clear Face Shield

Without windshield wipers, keeping a clear face shield is challenging. To clear your shield, you can turn your head left and right at speed to push the water away, or you can wipe it away with your glove. Some gloves have a finger squeegee which can be helpful. Treating your face shield

with a water-shedding product can also be helpful; however, be aware that some products are meant for glass only and can harm a plastic face shield, so read the label carefully before using anything on your face shield.



Fogging is another problem that comes with riding in the rain, especially when it's cold. A breath guard that deflects your exhaled breath down has been proven to be very effective, but you have to breathe through your mouth, you can't talk, and they can be uncomfortable and inconvenient.

There are also a number of anti-fog products available that can be applied to your face shield, but results can vary significantly.

Another option that has been shown to be very effective is a Pinlock visor insert. The Pinlock visor insert is made out of a material that contains moisture absorbing properties. The inner part of the Pinlock is lined with a silicon bead that creates a double-glazed window type of effect when the Pinlock visor insert is attached to the helmet visor. The pocket of air that is trapped in between the visor and the insert acts as an insulator for the inside temperatures in the helmet. Efficient absorption properties combined with the double-glazed like feature make the Pinlock visor insert an effective anti-fog solution.



Before buying any anti-fog treatment product, you may want to check to see if your helmet maker has an anti-fog shield or Pinlock shield insert option as these often outperform applied treatments.

Be Seen






Being seen by others is just as important as being able to see, especially in reduced visibility conditions. Rain gear with bright, high visibility colors along with reflective piping and decals will help you stand out on those gloomy days. Also make sure all your lights are working properly. (You did a full T-CLOCS safety inspection before you left for your ride, right?) Signal your intentions early before you slow down so you don't get rear-ended. See and be seen by adjusting your lane position to create the best line of sight for both you and your motorcycle.

Ride Smooth and Ride Smart

Be smooth when riding on wet roads. It is very important to remember that traction is reduced in wet conditions. Reduce your lean angle when cornering and keep your arms relaxed. By bracing your legs and lower torso against the pegs and gas tank, your arms and upper body will be more relaxed going into a turn, which reduces the force on the front tire needed to counteract upper body tension.

Slow down and increase your following distance to give yourself more time and space to respond to hazards and to minimize the risk of hydroplaning. Remember that traction is reduced not only by the water on a wet road, but also from accumulated road grime, grease and oil that the water will raise from the road surface. A steady rain will eventually wash the slime away, but this takes time. The road is likely to be especially slick just after the rain starts, especially if it hasn't rained for many days. Also remember that most road goop settles in the middle of the traffic lane, so use extra caution and be gentle when accelerating or breaking in that area of the road. Road paint, tar snakes, railroad tracks, steel-grate bridges and construction plates become extremely slick when wet, so slow way down, stay as upright as possible and avoid breaking and accelerating when crossing over them. Additionally, keep an eye out for low spots in the road where water can puddle and hide debris.


